Crime and Punishment

arson



The criminal act of deliberately setting fire to property.

witness



A person who sees an event, such as a crime, take place.

victim



A person harmed, injured, or killed as a result of a crime, accident or other event.

theft

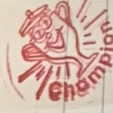


The action or crime of stealing, taking something you do not own.

murder



The act of killing someone deliberately, not my accident.



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The act of being put to death or punishment for breaking the law.

pillory



A wooden frame with holes for the head and hands where someone would be forced to stay for lengths of time and be embarrassed in public, sometimes having things thrown at them.

exile



To be sent away from home country forever, and never allowed to come back.

court



A group of people, including a judge and jury, who come together and decide on whether people are guilty or not according to the law.

jury



A group of usually twelve people who give a verdict in case based on information that is presented in court.

judge



This is a person who has been chosen to decide cases in law court.
